Bulk Fuel Marines keep aircraft in sky during TACP

Marines with Marine Wing Support Squadron 274's Bulk Fuels kept Marine Corps aircraft in the air during Tactical Air Control Party at the Marine Corps Auxiliary Landing Field Bogue, Monday - Wednesday. The Marines conducted "hot" and "cold" refueling and reloading during the TACP missions.

"This training gives our Marines a chance to fully use and understand our systems," said Sgt. Wallace Renshaw, a Cherry Point Bulk Fuel specialist. "I'm hoping to see that the Marines have a basic understanding of what their job is. Bulk Fuel is not a glamorous job, but it has its purpose. Everybody in the Marines Corps needs fuels for something."

A system called the tactical airfield fuel dispensing system is used during hot refuels. Aircraft are taxied into the fuel pits, and with engines still running are refueled.

"It's dangerous but you just really have to pay attention to what's going on around you," said Lance Cpl. Alex Adams, a MWSS-274 Bulk Fuel specialist. "Depending on the aircraft, you have roaders going, or the engine can suck you in. You have all these things while handling a vast amount of fuel."

In an average month bulk fuel specialists distribute roughly 20,000 gallons of fuel to support the missions of 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing. This keeps the Cherry Point aircraft in the air completing sortie missions during operations like the TACP.

The TACP's primary goal is to conduct as many sortie's as they can. This gives the aviation personnel more practice time in the air and keeps 2nd MAW better equipped for its mission of being the II Marine Expeditionary Force's rapid-deployment aviation and force-in-readiness. The faster the specialists refuel the aircraft the faster it gets back in the air.

The TACP is an exercise designed to focus on developing skills that would be used in a realistic expeditionary or deployed environment.

Before the aircraft can be refueled it must first be grounded to a static reel. This eliminates all static electricity that could potentially start a spark and ignite the fuel. The ground-crew with the specialist then make sure the pilots to turn off all blinking lights on the aircraft.

"Spills can happen," said Adams, jokingly but serious. "Luckily I've never seen a fire, but it is fuel so you just have to be careful."

While some Marines train the bulk fuel

Preparing for approaching storm

Hurricane season officially started June 1 and as the threat of Hurricane Irene looms near the East Coast the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has provided information to prepare for the eventuality of destructive weather.

The ingredients for a hurricane include a pre-existing weather disturbance, warm tropical oceans, moisture, and relatively light winds aloft.

Each year, an average of eleven tropical storms develop over the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea, and Gulf of Mexico. Many of these remain over the ocean and never impact the U.S. coastline. Six of these storms become hurricanes each year. In an average 3-year

period, roughly five hurricanes strike the US coastline, killing approximately 50 to 100 people anywhere from Texas to Maine. Of these, two are typically "major" or "intense" hurricanes (a category 3 or higher storm on the Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Scale).

A Hurricane

A hurricane is a type of tropical cyclone, which is a generic term for a low pressure system that generally forms in the tropics. The cyclone is accompanied by thunderstorms and, in the Northern Hemisphere, a counterclockwise circulation of winds near the earth's surface. Tropical cyclones are classified as follows:

Sustained winds

A 1-minute average wind measured at about 33 ft (10 meters) above the

surface.

1 knot = 1 nautical mile per hour or 1.15 statute miles per hour. Abbreviated as "kt".

Tropical Depression

An organized system of clouds and thunderstorms with a defined surface circulation and maximum sustained winds* of 38 mph (33 kt**) or less

Tropical Storm

An organized system of strong thunderstorms with a defined surface circulation and maximum sustained winds of 39-73 mph (34-63 kt)

Hurricane

An intense tropical weather system of strong thunderstorms with a well-defined surface circulation and maximum sustained winds of 74 mph (64 kt) or higher.

FAMILY DISASTER PLAN

- Discuss the type of hazards that could affect your family. Know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding and wind.
- Locate a safe room or the safest areas in your home for each hurricane hazard. In certain circumstances the safest areas may not be your home but within your community.
- Determine escape routes from your home and places to meet.
- Have an out-of-state friend as a family contact, so all your family members have a single point of contact.
- Make a plan now for what to do with your pets if you need to evacuate.

Post emergency telephone numbers by your phones and make sure your children know how and when to call 911.

- Check your insurance coverage - flood damage is not usually covered by homeowners insurance. National Flood Insurance Program
- Stock non-perishable emergency supplies and a Disaster Supply Kit.
- Use a NOAA weather radio. Remember to replace its battery every 6 months, as you do with your smoke detectors.

- Take First Aid, CPR and disaster preparedness classes.

Sergeant receives Purple Heart, shares experience with Marines



Improvised explosive devices are one of the greatest dangers to Marines in Afghanistan. On Aug. 7, Sgt. Kyle R. Kuska, a combat engineer with Marine Wing Support Squadron 271, received a Purple Heart for surviving an IED attack May 7 during his last tour in Afghanistan.

At the time, Kuska was a commander for an engineering convoy sent to improve roads near Marjah. A 40 lb. bomb, triggered by a pull-string mechanism, went off in front of Kuska's Humvee, causing damage to the vehicle and wounding two. Adrenaline and training kicked in, channeling the human body's natural fight-or-flight response into a positive action.

"I remember not being able to breathe or see anything. I remember hearing my gunner say that he was okay and my driver say that he was okay, that the vehicle was still mobile," said Kuska. "I remember saying, 'push, push, push,'

Chaplain's Corner : Written on God's Hand

We can get loose from God occasionally. At first it's fun. We can do exactly what we want, no restrictions and no limitations. But then, after a little while, we feel uncomfortable. Where is our familiar God? God searches for each one of us when we wander off. Our God cannot rest because his heart burns with urgency much like that mom or dad in the mall searching for their son when he has wandered away.

Once I asked a corporal a question. She listened intently to my question and then wrote it on the palm of her hand. She said, "Sir, I'll get right back to you!" Watching her write my question on the palm of her hand let me know that she would be back with the answer. No more than 10 minutes later she returned with the answer I was searching for!

In a very similar way, God cannot forget us because our names are written on his hands. Yes, you heard me cor-

rectly. Our names are written on God's hands. How do I know? The prophet Isaiah in the Old Testament described God's love for us in such a way as our creator writing my name and your name on the palm of his hand! Let me set the scene for you. Some 700 years before the birth of Jesus, God's people, the Israelites, were being battered into submission by powerful enemies. Israel's leading citizens were being exiled. There was every reason to feel hopeless. On the edge of despair, the people of Israel cried out, "The Lord has forsaken me. My Lord has forgotten me."

Have you ever felt that way? Maybe the husband or wife who promised to love and cherish you did not keep that promise. Perhaps the son or daughter in whom you invested so much of yourself shows little appreciation. Perhaps your career hasn't worked out the way you hoped or planned. Maybe a religious leader disappointed you. You may have been the victim of abuse. Perhaps that biopsy you prayed so hard about came back positive, and you watched a loved one pass away.

If you have been in any of these hard places, you perhaps cried out as did the ancient Israelites: "The Lord has forsaken me. My Lord has forgotten me." Even Jesus as he agonized on the cross, shouted out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Then we hear the mighty word of assurance from Isaiah: God has not forsaken you. God cannot forsake you. As long as you live and breathe, God cannot desert you. Isaiah asked this question: Is a mother with a tiny nursing baby capable of deserting that child? Everybody knows that it is almost impossible. The bond between mother and baby is perhaps the strongest human tie. Yet, says Isaiah, a mother could desert a child more easily than God could desert you and me.

Isaiah found another powerful image that dramatically illustrates God's unchanging love for us. Even in the Eighth Century, B.C., young men did what they still do today. As an expression of endless love they tattooed the

“There’s no room for error here,” said Campbell. “If we mess up, a jet’s not flying.” Thanks to the desert atmosphere of their home base at Marine Corps Air Station Yuma,

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

Division Marines run, row, cycle for wounded vets

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Helmand province, Afghanistan — Day-shift workers in 2nd Marine Division's (Forward) intelligence section wait until nightfall to squeeze in their cardio. They are tired from working all day, but they have committed to a goal of running hundreds of miles in a mere six months and aren't going to get there by sleeping.

These Marines are participating in the Leatherneck 236 Challenge. They chose to complete distances of 236, 472 or 944 miles from May 10 to Nov. 10, the Marine Corps' 236th birthday, to raise money for the Wounded Warrior Project and the British Limbless Ex Service Men's Association.

The intel Marines have found their groove and are benefiting from the extra exercise since starting the challenge.

"Running five or six days a week definitely gets you in better shape, especially with the altitude," said Garrett, Ind., native Sgt. Britany Rivera, the production and analysis day chief in the intel section. "You just notice that you get acclimated and it's just so much easier after every day."

Rivera prefers to run her miles but the rules allow participants to row, cycle or use an elliptical machine to complete the pledged distance if they so choose, said British army Cpl. Richard McNeilly, from Newtowards, Northern Ireland, and one of the event's coordinators. This has attracted Marines who like to mix up their cardio routine.

"I get bored easily if I do one thing, so I break it up," said Clear Lake, Iowa, native Gunnery Sgt. Chad Trebil, the intel section operations chief. "I usually do between seven and ten miles, sometimes up to 15 a day through a combination of rowing, running and elliptical."

It can be difficult for Marines at Camp Leatherneck to find time to work out while deployed due to long working hours and shift changes. The participants, determined to stay in shape while in Afghanistan, say the challenge has helped them to find the motivation to get out and train whenever they can.

"(The challenge) gives me a little more motivation to get out there instead of (saying), 'I'm tired, I just want to go to my room and sleep,'" said Trebil, who has committed to completing 944 miles. "Plus, I get to challenge my Marines – kind of compete against them. So far I'm beating

them pretty good."

The challenge has brought out a competitive spirit between other Marines in the intel section as well. Rivera currently has a friendly bet going with Cpl. Matthew Jenkins, an intelligence analyst in her section. Both have pledged to run 472 miles but each plans to exceed that distance, the winner determined by who has logged the most miles by Nov. 10. Rivera said she recently returned from a rest and recuperation period and fell behind, but now he's on R&R and she plans on pounding the pavement hard to gain the upper hand.

"(I said), 'I'm in better shape than he is,' and he said, 'No, I'm in better shape,'" said Rivera with a slight grin. "What it comes down to is who can actually do more miles. I'm not going to let a corporal beat me because I'm a sergeant – I mean, how would that look?"

The Leatherneck 236 Challenge is approximately half-over and both Trebil and Rivera have logged about half their required miles. They are determined to finish what they started and continue to sweat, not snooze, during their free time to ensure it happens.

First living Marine since Vietnam to receive nation's highest military award for valor

Of the Marines who fought to take Mount Siribachi, Admiral Chester Nimitz said, "Uncommon Valor was a common virtue."

That statement still rings true to the Marines of the present serving all around the globe. Sgt. Dakota Meyer made this fact evident by the actions that earned him a nomination for America's most prestigious decoration for valor, the Medal of Honor.

The simple pale blue ribbon holding a star like device is only worn by those who have gone above and beyond the call of duty and demonstrated unbridled heroism.

Meyer will receive the Medal of Honor from President Barrack Obama during a ceremony at the White House, Sept. 15, for his heroic actions in Afghanistan

nearly two years ago.

Meyer will be the first living Marine to earn this award since the Vietnam War era.

Meyer is a 23-year-old Greensburg, Ky., native, who served as a scout sniper and infantryman with 3rd Battalion 3rd Marines at Marine Corps Base Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.

During his second deployment, while serving with Marine Embedded Training Team 2-8, Meyer, with shrapnel in his right arm, charged through a kill zone five times to save 15 wounded Afghan soldiers and four of his fallen team members at Ganjal Village in Afghanistan in 2009.

About the attack in Afghanistan, Meyer said, "There's not a day, not a second that goes by where I don't think about what happened that day. I didn't just lose four Marines that day, I lost four brothers."

Meyer ended his tour of active duty in June 2010 and returned home to Kentucky where he now works in his family's profession.

"Sgt. Meyer embodies all that is good about our nation's Corps of Marines," said Gen. James F. Amos, commandant of the Marine Corps. "He is a living example of the brave young men and women whose service, fidelity and sacrifice make us so proud."

The humble Meyers said he is no hero, he just did what any other Marine would do in that situation.

"The award honors the men who gave their lives that day, and the men who were in that fight," Meyer said, according to a Marine newsletter. "I didn't do anything more than any other Marine would."

"I was put in an extraordinary circumstance, and I just did my job."

A HERO'S ACTIONS

Overview – On Sept. 8, 2009, approximately 15 kilometers south into the Ganjal Village, Kunar Province, Afghanistan, Embedded Training Team (ETT) 2-8, Regional Corps Advisory Command 3-7 joined together with elements of 1st Kandak, 2nd Brigade, 201st Corps of Afghan National Army (ANA) and 2nd Kandak of the Afghan Border Police for a joint operation to conduct a key leader engagement with village elders to discuss security development plans. Marine ETT advisers were allocated in groups of four to pair with ANA/ABP forces. At the time, Sergeant (then-Corporal) Dakota L. Meyer was serving with his four-man ETT including 1st Lt. Michael Johnson, Staff Sgt. Aaron Kenefick, and Corpsman Third Class James Layton. The joint operation unit was organized into four elements: an observation post, a quick reaction force (QRF), a dismounted patrol and a security element at the objective rally point (ORP). Meyer was tasked to the security element at the ORP while his ETT team, now joined by Gunnery Sgt. Edwin Johnson, served as the forward element of the joint operation unit.

Ambush – The joint operation unit, consisting of American Soldiers, Marines and ANA/ABP forces, dismounted at the ORP, leaving behind the vehicles with Staff Sgt. Juan Rodriguez-Chavez and Cpl. Meyer. From his position, Cpl. Meyer watched the patrol make way to the village on foot. As they approached, the lights in the village went out and the patrol was ambushed at approximately 0530 by more than 50 insurgents in well-fortified positions along a premeditated one-kilometer-long, U-shaped kill zone within Ganjal Village and from the mountains above Ganjal Valley.

The American Soldiers, Marines and ANA/ABP forces took cover, returned fire and made multiple attempts to call for artillery and air support. Meyer was instructed to remain at his post at the ORP. The forward element, his ETT, had been pinned down at their position and encircled by enemy fire. As casualties mounted, the joint operation unit remained pinned down without support for two hours. Upon listening to 1st Lt. Johnson yell over the radio, "If [you] don't give me this air support, we are going to die out here," Meyer requested permission to enter the kill-zone and was denied the four times he asked. After four denials, he took it upon himself to leave his relatively safe location at the ORP. Meyer mounted a gun truck with Rodriguez-Chavez as the driver.

Rescue – With contact to the forward element lost, Meyer and Rodriguez-Chavez drove the kilometer of the kill zone and entered into the heaviest zone of fire, without the aid of supporting arms, in order to aid wounded American Soldiers, Marines and ANA/ABP forces. The two Marines became the focus of enemy fire, as a barrage of mortars, rocket-propelled-grenades, machine gun and small arms fire was sent their way.

Without hesitation, Meyer and Rodriguez-Chavez evacuated wounded,

provided essential aid and recovered bodies of the joint operation unit taking them back to the casualty collection point, then ventured back into the kill zone four more times, still in search of the forward element.

Upon reentry, Rodriguez-Chavez warned Meyer that they may get stuck in the rough terrain ahead. In spite of this risk, Meyer remained steadfast, remarking, "I guess we'll die with them." As forward movement resumed, the two continued to be the target of attack by the enemy. Rodriguez-Chavez maneuvered the HMMWV while Meyer stayed off the enemy with effective fire atop the turret. An artillery malfunction forced the two Marines to return to the ORP to swap vehicles for a working heavy machine gun. Along the route back, more wounded were discovered, retrieved and transported to safety. In the course of the exchange, Meyer sustained a laceration to his arm from RPG and mortar fire, but it did not deter him.

Still in search of his ETT, Meyer led a fifth and final charge back into the kill zone accompanied by Marine 1st Lt. Ademola Fabayo and Army Capt. William Swenson. Air support finally came hours into the firefight in the form of a UH-60 helicopter providing much-needed cover. The PARARES-CUEMEN aboard the helicopter informed Meyer of spotting what appeared to be four bodies. Meyer dismounted the HMMWV and ran to the identified location. Even with the helicopter keeping an eye on him from above, Meyer was in a riskier position now than he would have been if he had stayed close to the vehicles with other members of his group. He was out in front of the group, moving near buildings and terrain and drawing a high volume of enemy fire. Meyer, disregarding continuing small arms, RPG, mortar and machine gun fire, ran into the direction of the helicopter until he came upon the lifeless bodies of the four missing Marine advisors – his ETT. Moving out of the ditch, across the danger zone, he transported the bodies with the assistance of Swenson and the ABP commander.

Conclusion – Over the course of a six-hour firefight, without regard for his own personal safety, Meyer entered the kill zone five separate times to evacuate the wounded, provide essential aid and, ultimately, saved the lives of 13 Marines and 23 Afghan soldiers. Meyer personally killed at least eight Taliban insurgents, while providing cover for his team to fight their way out and escape certain death.

Still after all his valiant effort, Meyer does not consider himself a hero. "The heroes are the men and women still serving," he said.

For his actions on Sept. 8, 2009, his selfless valor that day in keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Services, Sgt. Dakota L. Meyer has earned the distinguished recognition of being awarded the Medal of Honor.

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


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


Cherry Point ruggers dominate Camp Lejeune, raise money for fallen brethren

Drinking in the line of duty

PMO Marines earn qualification to conduct sobriety tests

Before 2:30 in the afternoon the Marines were drunk. As the students of the standardized field sobriety test entered the room the smell of stale beer and vodka stung the nostrils. Luckily Aug. 18 was not a typical day for the Marines of the MCAS Cherry Point Provost Marshal's Office.

After two days of training in the classroom the students with PMO and local police forces were certified to conduct motor vehicle field sobriety tests. As an added bonus, volunteers from PMO sacrificed their Thursday afternoon to be under the influence of alcohol so the newly certified Marines could test their skills.

"Field sobriety tests have been around since the mid 70's," said retired N.C. police officer Ken Rhodes, who is with the N.C. Forensic Test for Alcohol Branch and the administrator of the field sobriety test course. "The last study of this test was in the 1990's and has been proven to be 95 percent effective in catching drivers under the influence."


It is a common assumption that for anyone 21 or older that they are clear to drive if their blood alcohol content is at .08 percent or less. This is false. In fact, an officer can arrest any driver that has been drinking if there is suspicion the driver is too impaired to handle their vehicle. Meaning, a driver can be detained even if they have a BAC of .04 or even .02, explained Rhodes.

"This course has been great," said Cpl. Preston Davenport, a senior patrolman with Cherry Point PMO. "It was broken down enough to really understand it but not enough for it to be boring. It has a lot more detail than what we were learning in the school house. This course really shows the effects of alcohol and I've enjoyed it and learned a lot."

The Marines were taught to recognize clues to determine whether suspects are intoxicated or not. Some clues they learned were more obvious than others.

Obvious clues included slurred speech, memory loss and physical impairment. Less obvious clues were hidden anywhere, even deep within their eyes.

"Alcohol is a central nervous system

depressant that shows clues that the body has no control of," said Rhodes. "An example of this is involuntary jerking of the eyes; it affects the ability of small muscle movements throughout the body and short term memory. This test covers all of those bases."

The volunteers were given a controlled amount of alcohol but were still way above the legal limit to be driving. The volun-

teers were also monitored throughout the duration of the course to keep them medically safe.

"Don't ever drink too much," warned volunteer Cpl. Nathaniel Warren, a patrolman with Cherry Point PMO, as he went through the field sobriety test. "You'll get sick, and do not ever drink and drive."

"new guy" must learn the "lingo." The intelligence field is no different. But, Marines don't have time to waste. To ease that transition and help new intelligence Marines hit the ground running a class was created called the Squadron Intelligence Course.

Aug. 8 marked the first day of the month-long inaugural class. It was established for intelligence Marines assigned to aviation units; specifically integrating 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing intelligence personnel with pilots at the Marine Attack Training Squadron 203, explained the SIC director, Capt. Troy Klabo, who is also the 2nd MAW intelligence operation officer and pioneer of the SIC.

The students of the SIC cover a wide variety of Marine Aviation topics, and AV-8B specifics. They cover aircraft systems, ordnance, aircraft survivability equipment, employment, mission planning and intelligence tasks. The Marines learn about aviation and intelligence doctrine and command structure and organization.

The intelligence Marines received hands-on training on the AV-AB Harrier and got a closer look at different weapons the attack fighter jet can carry.

"As an intelligence specialist it's our job to brief the pilots on their mission; what they're going to be doing, and the threats they may face," said Lance Cpl. Kaleigh Pendergrass, an intelligence specialist with Marine Wing Headquarters Squadron 2. "But it's good for us to have a general knowledge of everything that goes into getting the aircraft ready. That will help (us) with talking to the pilots because we will understand the pilot lingo specific to the AV-8B."

Typical duties of intelligence specialists involve the collection, recording, analysis, processing and dissemination of information and intelligence. In the air wing, Marines are supposed to know the air and ground side of their job; an added pressure to new intelligence

personnel assigned to Cherry Point.

"When the Marines begin their intelligence training at the Navy and Marine Corps Intelligence Training Center, in Dam Neck Va., they learn the very basics about intelligence and various cycles of operation," said Klabo. "But they're not really getting any aviation training."

The Marines first learn the six functions to Marine Corps Aviation which are the basics to all things in Marine Corps aviation. The six functions include; Electronic Warfare, Offensive Air Support, Assault Support, Control of Aircraft and Missiles, Anti-Air Warfare and Aerial Reconnaissance.

"This course has really helped us hone our skills as intelligence specialists," said Sgt. Jeremy Marrow, an intelligence specialist with MWHS-2. "There's been a lot of conceptual aspect of this course and I've always been a hands-on learner. I think so far it's been a really good course."

The goal for the training is within the next three years to have all aviation intelligence Marines certified through the Squadron Course.

"The training of our intelligence Marines does not end at Marine Corps intelligence schools. In order for a Marine to properly support his unit, it is incumbent upon that unit to continue the Marines education," said Maj. Michael Pretus, the deputy intelligence officer, with 2nd MAW. "This will enable the Intelligence Marine to better support the customer, in this case the Aviator. The Squadron Intelligence Course is designed to do just that by integrating Intelligence Marines and Aviators at the Training Squadron. Future plans include expanding the Squadron Intelligence Course to the other type, model, series Training Squadrons within the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing."

of there, the priorities were the casualties that we had to evacuate, getting our vehicles and gear accounted for and getting back to Marjah."

Because Kuska couldn't breathe, the assistant convoy commander took command and oversaw the rest of the operation. Kuska was evacuated to Marjah and then to Camp Leatherneck, where he was stabilized.

The ordeal left him with bruised ribs, a bruised sternum, a concussion and several lessons learned.

"I don't think it's actually hit me yet that I was involved in an IED ordeal," said Kuska. "It is an eye opener and puts everything in perspective as far as what's important, what really matters to you. For me, it's my wife and my kids. It's to do my job, make sure my Marines are taken care of, and to ultimately come back to my family."

Unfortunately, there are Marines from all specialties who deal with the dangers of IEDs every day in Afghanistan.

"You can be an admin guy or a ground pounder, but you're going to have to use a convoy to get from point A to point B. Just because a military occupational specialty isn't a combat related one specifically, doesn't mean that you won't see combat or IEDs."

Kuska said that one spring day in Afghanistan has forever shaped his life. It was an experience that reminded him to always be prepared and fight complacency with the right mindset.

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No plan survives contact with the enemy:

2nd MAW (Fwd) adjusts, reacts to aviation demands of war in Afghanistan

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan — Somewhere in the darkness, beyond the barbed wire and concrete walls of Camp Leatherneck an improvised explosive device detonates, killing one Marine and injuring another.

Shortly thereafter in a dimly-lit, windowless room on the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (Forward) compound, a phone rings. In many ways, the war is calling.

On the receiving end of the telephone, the burden now belongs to the Marines, Sailors and coalition troops with the Tactical Air Command Center. They now must dispatch a medevac to carry the wounded warrior and fallen hero from the battlefield.

"No later than 15 minutes after a request comes in, we have an aircraft in the air," said Lt. Col. Robert Cooper, a senior watch officer for the command center, and a native of Tulsa, Okla. "The standard is to have the person back within an hour to get them the medical attention they need, and we're typically well inside that."

"We're the first link in getting someone back," said Petty Officer 3rd Class Jeffrey T. Whitson, a native of Vidalia, Ga. and one of the corpsmen who stands medical watch for the command center.

2nd MAW (Fwd.), the aviation combat element for the southwestern regional command of NATO's International Security Assistance Force, is also a primary provider of close-air support, aerial reconnaissance, troop movement and aerial resupply.

The wing provides a dynamic array of support to ground forces as they work with the people of Afghanistan to rid the region of insurgent activity.

Cooper said air power is invaluable to those efforts.

"It's the asymmetrical advantage," Cooper said with an astute, confident smile. "Aviation provides a great kinetic effect and the ability to protect our troops, but often overlooked is the mobility. Traveling just two kilometers can be hazardous here because of IEDs, but the ability to aerially insert quickly probably the biggest thing we bring to the fight."

The room from which 2nd MAW (Fwd.) commands and controls that ability is small. Tiered rows point toward an array of monitors featuring maps, charts and live footage from Marine aircraft targeting systems. The troops man their posts in 8 to 12-hour shifts. Led by the senior watch officer, they must both execute a planned strategy and react to calls for medevacs and close-air support from the troops on the ground.

"No plan survives contact with the enemy," Cooper said.

In the six months that 2nd MAW (Fwd.) has been responsible for the air above Regional Command Southwest, in addition to many planned operations, the wing has supported 2,000 medevacs and double that number of immediate close-air support requests, Cooper estimated.

The high demand for air support means the Marines, Sailors and coalition members under the senior watch officer's charge must be able to quickly anticipate, prioritize and react when lives are on the line; a task that is often difficult.

In May, the enemy launched a coordinated assault on multiple positions simultaneously, a day 1st Lt. Martha A. Hiett, a senior representative for the Marine Air Command

and Control System at the command center, described as one of the most hectic days since she arrived in Afghanistan in February.

Insurgent activity was at abnormally high levels near Camp Leatherneck, and at many of the small combat outposts and forward operating bases that line Afghanistan's Helmand River valley.

"It was the day we took indirect fire here," said Hiett, a native of Willow Springs, Mo. "We received about 20 requests in an extremely short time frame, all priority or immediate."

But after a few hours of precision air strikes coordinated through the command center, Marines and their coalition partners had beaten the enemy back.

"We had no one killed in action that day, but we did have a few minor injuries," Hiett said. "But overall it was a very bad day for the enemy."

Deployed Marine helps save Corps time, money

CAMP DWYER, Afghanistan — Time is money. One Marine in Afghanistan is saving the U.S. government both.

The Navy and Marine Corps rely on a database to track maintenance requirements for their aircraft. But the database was becoming filled with unnecessary entries, causing it to malfunction. So, Headquarters Marine Corps sent a request to each aviation squadron in the Corps to delete the unnecessary records.

There was a problem however. There was no easy way to search for the unnecessary records – creating a slow and laborious process for the Marines tasked with cleaning up the database.

Staff Sgt. Dakin T. Werneburg of Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 269, created a program to make it easier for the Sailors and Marines to maintain the system.

"All I really did was create an advanced search tool that isolated these untracked components in the database to quickly identify where they were," explained Werneburg, the squadron's maintenance administration chief, and a native of Troy, N.Y. "It quickly helped my Marines delete these from the database, rather than spending time searching for them individually."

With the help of his search tool, Werneburg and the Marines of HMLA-269 were able to complete the request in about 45 days. The task was originally projected to take about a year.

"I just saw a way to do a job better and faster to help my Marines. In the end, it seems to have saved the Marine Corps money," said Werneburg, who is deployed with his squadron from Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C. "I look at it as a return on an investment because I learned all I know from the Marine Corps and I am just paying it forward."

Master Gunnery Sgt. Lee Voss, the maintenance admin-

istration chief for Marine aviation at Headquarters Marine Corps in Washington, said Werneburg's initiative will allow Marines more time to work on the actual aircraft.

"It took Marines away from the primary focus of their job, which is assisting pilots and other Marines," said Voss. "Staff Sgt. Werneburg's program saved the Marine Corps untold money by reducing man-hours. I commend him for his dedication and commitment to the aircraft maintenance administration community and Marine aviation as a whole."

Werneburg said he has extensive training in programming, so it took him only about three days to make the program – a project he undertook while deployed with his squadron to Camp Dwyer, Afghanistan.

"It is nothing compared to larger things Marines are doing out on the battlefield every day," added Werneberg. "I, just like any Marine, want to do the best I can at the job the Marine Corps assigns me to do and make it better for the next Marine."

From the clinic: Home Delivery

Beneficiaries who use Tricare pharmacy home delivery get prescription medications shipped conveniently to their door. Home delivery also gives beneficiaries the option of automatic prescription refills when their medication supply is running low.

"Automatic refills lower the chances of unsafe breaks in medication therapy, which can lead to emergency room visits, hospitalizations and other health care setbacks," said Rear Adm. Thomas J. McGinnis, chief of Tricare Pharmacy Operations. "Auto refills or reminders are especially helpful for anyone being treated for chronic, long term conditions. It also cuts down on last minute dashes to a retail pharmacy."

Tricare beneficiaries can include prescriptions in the automatic refill program when they first sign up for home delivery, or they can go back later to select that feature. Then, seven days before an automatic refill is scheduled for shipping, beneficiaries are reminded by email or phone that their medication supply may be running low. Unless they contact Express Scripts Inc., the pharmacy contractor, the prescription

will be automatically refilled.

"Automatic prescription refills offer convenience and peace-of-mind to beneficiaries," McGinnis said. "And it helps us meet our firm commitment to their health."

Beneficiaries using home delivery rather than civilian retail pharmacies also save money. Copayments at retail pharmacies are three times higher for a 90 day supply of the same medication – up to \$176 more per year for a brand name prescription. Beneficiaries switching from retail to home delivery also helped the Department of Defense save \$30 million in 2010.

This week in Marine Corps History

Aug. 23, 1984

The last Marines to serve peace-keeping duty in Lebanon arrived home. The 24th Marine Amphibious Unit arrived off the coast of Lebanon on April 9 to relieve Marines of the 22nd MAU who were guarding the U.S. Embassy in Beirut. The 24th MAU left Beirut July 31, marking the last presence of U.S. combat troops in Beirut since Marines entered almost two years earlier.

Aug. 24, 1814

Capt. Samuel Miller's 100-man detachment from Marine Barracks, Washington, fought in the battle of Bladensburg for the defense of the national capital. After helping to fight back three British charges, Miller was wounded and the enemy began to work around both flanks of the American force. Almost encircled, the force of Sailors and Marines was forced to retire to avoid capture. The Marines lost eight, and 14 were wounded.
