*Marines honor departed Osprey crew chief in Afghanistan*

**CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan** – Deployed Marines and Sailors gathered at the Regional Command Southwest Memorial Chapel on Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, to honor the life of Staff Sgt. Thomas J. Dudley July 18.

Dudley fell to his death from an MV-22 Osprey while conducting combat operations in southwestern Afghanistan, July 7.

“We will we commemorate his life and not his death,” said Sgt. Maj. George P. Aurelio, the Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 264 sergeant major. “We’re gathering to remember him for who he was, which was a great father, husband and Marine.”

Dudley, a native of Tega Cay, S.C., is survived by his wife, Mary, and three children.

“He’ll be missed dearly but he will be with us forever,” said Gunnery Sgt. Shawn A. Howard, the quality assurance chief for VMM-264, and a native of Brooksville, Fla. “This

Capt. Kevin O’Donnell, a quality assurance officer with Marine Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron 3 (VMAQ-3), and Gunnery Sgt. Matthew L. Rumfelt, a quality assurance chief with VMAQ-1, were given the Max McDonald and Bob Reiten awards for their hard work and dedication to the Marine Corps.

The Marines were selected for their inspirational leadership and achievements while being assigned to the VMAQ squadrons for the 2010 calendar year.

“It feels great getting this award,” said Rumfelt. “Max McDonald was a large part of our proud history here on Cherry Point and it’s a great honor receiving this award.”

Col. William “Max” McDonald spent more than 30 years working for the Northrop-Grumman Corporation as an EA-6B airframes technical adviser to Marine Prowler squadrons. McDonald was instrumental in the development of maintenance techniques and procedures still used by the Prowler community today.

While deployed, Rumfelt had an outstanding 99.8 percent sortie completion rate in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and 90 percent mission completion rate in 2010.

Maj. Joshua Gordon, the executive officer of VMAQ-1, spoke about Rumfelt and what an asset he has become in the squadron.

“He (Rumfelt) is one of those Marines that everybody recognizes to be the backbone of the maintenance department,” said Gordon.

Gordon said he knows this is an award for one man, but it also shows the hard work of all the staff noncommissioned officers of the squadron.

“I’d really have to thank my Marines,” said Rumfelt. “I wouldn’t have got this if it wasn’t for them.”

O’Donnell received the Bob Reiten award for his time with VMAQ-3 in support of Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. While deployed he was responsible for substantial improvements in the Airborne Electronic Attack support for 1st Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward). He provided a means for enhanced coordination and increased support to those units in the Marine Prowler community.

## Chaplain:

*Can chaplains pray ‘in Jesus’ name?’*

I have received a number of emails, mostly from well-meaning friends that have stated because of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), Navy chaplains are not allowed to “pray in Jesus’ name.” I would like to state clearly, this is not true. I have been serving in the Navy as a chaplain since 1992 and have never been told NOT to pray in Jesus’ name. Now having just made that statement I would like to explain the difference in the prayers between a command ceremony and a religious ceremony. Command ceremonies often require attendance whereas a religious ceremony does not. This difference is very important.

At a command ceremony, such as a change of command, Marine Corps Ball, relief and appointment, etc., the attendance of Marines and Sailors is mandated regardless of religious affiliation. At these ceremonies, because attendance is mandatory and there is no regard for religious affiliation, it is important to be as inclusive as possible. That is why you will hear many chaplains end their prayer with something like: “In your holy name we pray” or “Father in Your name we pray” or simply with an “Amen.” By doing this, the chaplain is not disregarding his or her own faith group. Rather, they are showing respect for other faith groups in light of the fact they have to be there.

For religious ceremonies or services that are faith specific, the chaplain will often end their prayers according to their faith. In my case, I pray in Jesus’ name. Again, the difference between the two is attendance. Religious services are not mandatory and command events are mandatory and not faith specific. I want to underscore that because I think it is so important, showing respect and being inclusive of other faith groups does not in any way diminish the significance of your own. By including others the occasion becomes their event as well and we all celebrate or mourn together. Amen!

# Hammerheads rehearse SPIE rigging techniques

The fierce winds created by helicopter blades churned the jellyfish-infested waves of the Atlantic Ocean, tossing and turning Marines and Sailors as they searched for the rope that dangled from the aircraft. The water practically blinded them as they collectively searched; holding on to each other so no man was left behind. The elusive rope began to pull on their harnesses and gradually lifted, propelling their bodies upward from the water.

Marines with Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 366 and Special Operations

Training Group, II Marine Expeditionary Force, practiced these techniques July 14 for special operations they may need to execute in the future.

The types of training methods used were special purpose insertion and extraction, helocasting and Jacobs ladder training all as a part of the SOTG's cast master course at Landing Zone 22 in the Atlantic Ocean July 14.

Helocast training gives the Marines a chance to practice exiting out of the rear of an aircraft. The helicopter hovers roughly 10 feet above the water and progresses forward at a slow 10 knots while the Marines jump out.

Jacobs' ladder training is when a rope ladder is lowered from the back of an aircraft. The SOTG Marines and Sailors grab hold and climb back into the aircraft.

Special insertion and extraction training is perhaps the most difficult and most hazardous training the Marines and Sailors endured. The service members attached themselves to a rope that was connected to the aircraft and then were pulled out of the water, dangled from the rope, and reinserted on dry land.

"The most difficult part is flying the aircraft with five Marines dangling below you, 300 feet off the ground," said Capt. David Berger, a CH-53E pilot with HMH-366. "The potential for something to go wrong is pretty high."

There's a little apprehension as the team prepares for the exercise, explained Sgt. Kyle Duignan, an amphibious raids instructor with SOTG. The Marines triple-

check their gear to make sure all is ready, checking over their own, then their buddies', and then again in the aircraft.

The Marines and Sailors were required to complete wet SPIE rigging along with the normal SPIE rigging done from land-to-land. The addition of water makes getting the job done that much more difficult and dangerous, noted Cpl. Kenneth Riles, a crew chief with HMH-366.

"Our biggest fear is for somebody to get injured," said Riles. "Somebody could hit their head on the way out of the aircraft and potentially drown, so we always have to be watching."

An additional hazard to the wet SPIE rigging training was the type of aircraft used. Usually the CH-53E isn't used for this, explained Berger. The downward wind the aircraft creates, known as rotor wash, forces water to spray against the dangling Marines adding confusion and making the task that much harder.

The Marines explained that they go through a wide range of emotions during the course that can vary from fear to pure adrenaline.

"We are constantly thinking about the safety of the Marines," said Berger. "If there's an unsafe situation, we'll spot it and bring the aircraft up immediately."

"When you go out it's about having a good time," said Duignan. "The first time is probably when you have the most apprehension, but for the most part, we're laughing and joking and just enjoying the ride."

# Rapid response: Attack helicopters move north to aid air ambulances

**FORWARD OPERATING BASE EDINBURGH, Afghanistan** — Until recently, if an injured Marine needed medical evacuation from the battlefield in the turbulent northeast of Afghanistan's Helmand province, the air ambulance providing care might not be able to assist until Marine Corps attack helicopters were on scene.

"That's a long time to wait for a casualty lying in a field," said Staff Sgt. Sean Redmond, the air traffic control chief at Forward Operating Base Edinburgh.

So, 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (Forward) moved a detachment of helicopters from Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 267 to FOB Edinburgh so that air ambulances and the attack helicopters that support them could be at the same place, at the same time, when they're needed most.

"I can get medevac helicopters from here to most locations in under 10 minutes," explained Redmond, who is deployed to Afghanistan with Marine Air Control Squadron 2.

Before aircraft were moved to the forward operating base, medical evacuations would have to wait for support from Camp Bastion. Redmond said the flight from Camp Bastion could sometimes take up to 30 minutes.

From the first day a detachment of AH-1W Cobras and UH-1Y Hueys with HMLA-267 arrived at the forward operating base, Redmond said he noticed an immediate improvement.

"That first day we flew five and a half flight-hours and responded to three medevacs we would not have been able to respond to without HMLA here," said Redmond.

From three computer monitors in his air traffic control tower, Redmond — who said his fellow Marines call him Popeye — is in constant communication with coalition units in his area of operations. He is personally responsible for coordinating movement of all aircraft in and out of FOB Edinburgh.

"Here at FOB Edinburgh we're not in the middle of the stew, but we're right on the edge of the pot," said Redmond, a native of Longmont, Colo. "We're the biggest little town this side of Camp Leatherneck."

Medical evacuations are supported by C Company of the 1st Battalion, 171st General Support Aviation Regiment, a combined unit of Minnesota, Arizona and New Mexico National Guard soldiers.

National Guard Capt. Jeremy Degier, the forward support medical platoon leader for C Company, said having the light attack helicopters on scene means injured coalition troops can receive faster care, and insurgents are less likely to attack the air ambulance helicopters.

"They have provided us with outstanding overwatch in rough situations, in high-threat areas, allowing us to get wounded combatants off the battlefield faster," said Degier. "It's really a godsend having this

dedicated asset, especially for where we are located."

Redmond said that the mere presence of the detachment is making a definite impact on daily operations within his airspace and to the troops on the ground.

"We're not catching the small-arms fire at some of these forward operating bases that we normally would, because they are here," said Redmond. "Now they know not to shoot at our medevacs because there is somebody watching overhead. If [the attack helicopters] never fire a gun while they're on a medevac mission, they've already done their job."

In addition to attack helicopters, a number of HMLA-267 maintenance Marines are now stationed at the FOB.

"Definitely our Marines that live here know what is going on," said Capt. Sean P. Dillon, a UH-1Y Huey pilot with HMLA-267. "We have all the necessary personnel

here. We have all the pilots, the maintainers and operators we need."

Dillon said that this Marine detachment allows aircraft to be refueled, receive ordnance, and conduct on-the-spot maintenance at the FOB, all contributing to a much quicker response time and more flexibility. Enhanced flexibility also means that attack helicopters can provide more hours of close-air support for Marines and their Afghan and coalition partners on patrols in violent areas.

"We're already out here and can attach to medevac platforms and go with them immediately to the point of injury," said Dillon. "That's giving the medics the overhead watch they need, and the grunts the coverage they need, all much faster."

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
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## Fueling the flight:

## VMGR-252 fuels Ospreys on cross country mission

Like a swarm of well-trained bees, a formation of KC-130J Hercules and MV-22B Ospreys flew across the country on a long-distance aerial refueling training exercise July 12.

Two 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing KC-130Js with Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron 252 based at Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point teamed up with four 3rd MAW KC-130s and several Ospreys from Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 365 based out of MCAS New River in a multi-unit exercise.

"We facilitated the training in a joint exercise with VMM-365 by providing

aerial refueling support on a transcontinental movement from MCAS New River to Twentynine Palms, (Calif.)" said Lance Cpl. Michael A. Reischman II, a loadmaster with VMGR-252.

Aerial refueling allows aircraft that normally couldn't travel long distances to travel an extended distance to enhance overall mission capabilities.

The four other KC-130s belonged to 3rd MAW's VMGR-352 out of MCAS Miramar, Calif., and 4th MAW's VMGR-234 out of Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth, TX.

Alongside each KC-130 was an Osprey flying on the nearly seven-hour flight to California. Whenever the Osprey needed

more fuel, the KC-130s descended their refueling tubes to attach to the Osprey, and without a moment's delay, the Ospreys were back in action with full tanks.

Constant communication between each aircraft is vital during these missions, and dealing with different squadrons of Marines that don't know each other adds difficulty.

Reischman explained the significance of working with other units is that it shows how different units can come together and accomplish the mission at hand.

"I believe the exercise went very well . . . the planning paid off greatly," added Capt. Nicholas L. Arhur, a KC-130 naval aviator with VMGR-252.

After the cross-country escort, the VMGR squadrons continued to Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Ariz., to stop for the night. The following day the various squadrons returned to their parent units.

The multi-unit, multi-platform movement demonstrated how the Marine Corps adapts and overcomes any situation, said Reischman. "Using the services of one of the U.S. military's oldest currently operating platforms, the C-130, with the enhanced capabilities of the ground-breaking MV-22 Osprey, our Marines have once again showed that they are up to any task."

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# 6 Marines, 3 couples, 1 squadron: Married Marines deploy together to Afghanistan

**CAMP BASTION, Afghanistan** — Michael and Jessica Stedman recently celebrated their first anniversary. They also recently deployed to Afghanistan together.

"We never got to take a honeymoon," said Jessica. She and her husband both serve as corporals in the Marine Corps. The couple deployed here with Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 267 in May.

"So here we are in Afghanistan," she added. "It has all the sand you could ever want and the sun always shines. The only thing is we just haven't found the beaches yet."

The Stedmans are not alone. They are one of three married couples currently deployed with the Camp Pendleton, Calif., based helicopter squadron.

"Everyday's a good day because I get to see my husband and know that he's alive and healthy," said Jessica, a native of De Pere, Wis., and an airframes and hydraulics mechanic for the squadron. "I don't have to worry about him as much, like I would be doing if I was home."

But the Stedmans said they know statistics are against them. Historically, divorce rates for junior Marines are above the national average – higher still for dual-military couples. But Michael and Jessica said courses for engaged and newlywed Marines on life skills and relationship communication have helped them to overcome stresses that come with a young marriage, stresses compounded when both husband and wife serve overseas.

"I personally think being married to another Marine is the best situation for me," said Michael, a helicopter mechanic with HMLA-267, and a native of Brunswick, Ga. "Jessica and I have been good friends for almost three years, and just like any other relationship, I think you have to be good friends first."

Cpl. Joshua and Sgt. Denise King, also with HMLA-267, are not only newlyweds, but also new parents. When the couple left California, they said son Julian, now 10-months old, was just learning to roll over.

"I'm sure he'll be walking by the time we get back," said Joshua, an intelligence analyst with HMLA-267. "For both of us the hardest part of this deployment is being away from him."

Joshua, of Battle Ground, Wash., and Denise, a native of Los Angeles, explained family will take care of their son throughout their time in Afghanistan, with both the mother's and father's parents helping to create a stable environment for their son while they are away from home. The couple said that hope for future stability, and the goal of providing a better future for their son, is why they deployed.

"I think that's ultimately why we settled on both of us coming out here," said Joshua. "We want to be able to give him the best life possible, and a lot of times that means making sacrifices. It will all be worth it in the end."

"We met because we were working together," Krystal added. "Now that we are married and working together, we keep it completely professional. When we are at work that's what we are doing. We see each other as peers, as fellow Marines."

Krystal and her husband, Branden, said they believe it's important to maintain their professionalism as Marines, especially while on deployment together.

"If you do your job and keep the mission in your mind, then there will be no problems," said Branden. "We understand each other and are able to separate our personal and professional lives together. I'm not saying it doesn't get difficult sometimes, but you have to do it."

All three couples said being married in the U.S. and being deployed together to Afghanistan are entirely different. As a rule, couples aren't allowed to live together in Afghanistan, even if they are married, and though husband and wife might work in the same squadron, they may work different shifts – limiting the time they are able to see each other. But the couples agreed communication is key to a healthy marriage, wherever the couple may be.

"Our relationship has grown in the time that we have been deployed. We have to communicate a lot more, not that we didn't back in the states, but out here communication is all we have," said Joshua King. "Having my wife out here is definitely a pro. It's amazing being married to someone who knows everything that you do and understands the Marine Corps like you do."

"It was really surprising getting the award," said O'Donnell "I feel the entire squadron deserves it, not just me. All of the company grade officers are working hard so it's really for all of them."





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# Marine Corps UAVs get new home in Afghanistan

**CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan** — Marine Corps unmanned aerial vehicles have a new home at Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan.

Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron 3 formed a new detachment located here to help 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (Forward) provide intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance support in southwestern Afghanistan.

The new detachment became fully operational when it launched its first unmanned aerial vehicle from Camp Leatherneck, an RQ-7B Shadow in support of 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, June 30.

The unmanned aerial vehicle squadron began planning for a detachment at Camp Leatherneck prior to its deployment from Twentynine Palms, Calif., explained Maj. Matt L. Walker, the officer in charge of VMU-3 Marines at Camp Leatherneck.

Deployed Marine unmanned aerial vehicle squadrons have traditionally maintained multiple operating points for UAVs, including Camp Dwyer, Combat Outpost Payne, and Forward Operating Bases Edinburgh and Delaram II.

"The squadron took a look at where our UAVs were going to be positioned, and the area we were capable of flying missions over before we deployed to Afghanistan, and saw that we had some uncovered areas," said Walker. "We thought about how we could better position ourselves to support ground troops. When the advance party of VMU-3 Marines deployed to Afghanistan the idea of having a second detachment located at Leatherneck was presented to 2nd MAW (Fwd.)"

The proposal to 2nd MAW (Fwd.) was approved, and within a month the squadron was set up and fully operational on Camp Leatherneck, Walker said.

"A portion of the decision to set up a detachment at Camp Leatherneck was preparation for the summer fighting season," he said. "We can better support dismounted patrols and we can help protect the troops on the ground."

"We will do everything we can to give those Marines on the ground the coverage and eye in the sky they need,"

Walker added.

Marine Corps UAV squadrons use small, lightweight vehicles that are able to stay in the air for several hours to supply Marines and their coalition partners with aerial information throughout combat missions.

"We are in the best position to support Marines on the deck across Regional Command Southwest, which is what this is all about," said Walker. "This move just gives us greater flexibility with the area we can fly over."

"I think this move was a great idea," said Cpl. Ryan P. Pavin, an UAV operator with VMU-3, and a native of Chicago. "I knew at first it would be a lot of work to get set up but I think we can do a lot to help the Marines on

the ground and get the information they need."

In preparation for the UAV squadron's move, engineers and heavy equipment operators with Marine Wing Support Squadron 272 leveled and flattened the ground for the new VMU-3 runway, and MWSS-272 expeditionary airfield Marines followed behind, laying down aluminum matting used as the UAV landing strip.

"It took the engineers approximately 10 days to do the ground work," said Staff Sgt. Cory D. Sikes, the expeditionary airfields chief for MWSS-272, and a native of Holdrege, Neb. "It took us seven days to lay the matting, and we completed it all well under our estimated completion date."

MWSS-272, deployed out of Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C., supports 2nd MAW (Fwd.) through ground refueling, aircraft recovery, firefighting, expeditionary airfield services and more.

"MWSS-272 had a huge part in helping us get set up here in the new location," said Walker. "Without them none of this would have happened."

Not only did MWSS-272 prepare the VMU-3 runway and operations area, the support squadron also convoyed to Camp Dwyer to pick up the new detachment's equipment and transport it to Camp Leatherneck.

"The convoy was completed on a very short timeline," said Gunnery Sgt. Donald Rogers, the MWSS-272 operations chief, and native of Mauston, Wis. "We loaded all of their gear they would need for operations and delivered it to the new compound on Camp Leatherneck."

"Within three days, we had UAVs in the air, doing test flights and our working areas constructed," said Walker. "The speed the MWSS had in completing its mission made our mission easier."

For the UAVs themselves, the squadron convoyed some of the aircraft, and flew others from Camp Dwyer to their new home at Camp Leatherneck.

"VMU-3 has proven that the Shadow is expeditionary," said Walker. "We've proven that we can move about the battlespace if we need to, quickly and efficiently."

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# Logistics squadron keeps aircraft flying in Afghanistan

**CAMP BASTION, Afghanistan** — Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 40 has one mission, to guarantee 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (Forward) squadrons are never left without ordnance, working equipment or the parts they need to keep aircraft in the fight in Afghanistan.

Maj. Michael Kline, the executive officer of MALS-40, explained how this is accomplished and what sets his squadron apart from the others.

Kline noted MALS-40 is a provisional squadron, stood up specifically to deploy here. The Marines and Sailors who make up the squadron in Afghanistan actually come from 17 different aviation logistics squadrons around the world.

The total structure of MALS-40, which is the largest squadron in 2nd MAW (Fwd.), is comprised of more than 650 Marines and Sailors from all four Marine aircraft wings, and home stations ranging from Cherry Point, N.C., to Iwakuni, Japan.

"Most units that deploy over here come over as one defined unit," said Kline. "No Marine is a MALS-40 Marine until they come over here. For instance, I came from MALS-26 back in New River. That's what's unique about us."

Kline said he thinks another factor that helps MALS-40 support 2nd MAW (Fwd.) is that most of the Marines who make up the squadron volunteered for the deployment.

"I would say about 95 percent of the Marines who are here with MALS-40 are Marines who raised their hands and said, 'I want to go,'" said Kline. "The Marines who are here want to be here. They want to be part of the fight, they want to do their job, and that just brings a different attitude and more productivity."

Integrating so many Marines from different units into their new squadron is not a seamless integration in every case.

"There have been challenges with the Marines coming from different units," said Kline, a native of St. Louis, Mo. "Most of them center on the fact that we didn't train together or really know each other before we came out here. We were never afforded the opportunity to have the crawl, walk, run process. This was definitely a challenge and the biggest issue we've had to overcome."

One of the biggest contributions MALS-40 makes to 2nd MAW (Fwd.) is the maintaining of aircraft parts and equipment.

Master Gunnery Sgt. Charles Hughes, the maintenance chief for Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 264 explained the importance of the job MALS-40 maintenance provides.

"From a maintenance standpoint, without MALS-40 support, we as a squadron would not be able to meet our daily mission," said Hughes. "Without the maintenance support provided by MALS, the aircraft would become giant paperweights."

Hughes and his squadron, deployed to Camp Bastion from Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C., use the MV-22B Osprey to provide fast and efficient assault support for Marines and their Afghan and coalition partners in southwestern Afghanistan.

"There isn't a day that goes by that we don't depend on MALS for some type of support," said Hughes, a native of McComb, Miss. "Whether that's support equipment to remove a rotor head or MALS supply providing the necessary part when the original piece goes bad or breaks."

Another area where MALS-40 Marines help out is in providing ordnance to the squadrons of 2nd MAW (Fwd.).

"We provide the ordnance to the wing that prevents the bad guys from getting to the good guys on the ground," explained Gunnery Sgt. Timothy Dorrill, the ordnance chief for MALS-40. "I believe that the aviation ordnance piece that we have provided has been above the expectations of the squadrons here."

"Every MALS-40 ordnance Marine should feel proud of the job they have done," said Dorrill, a native of Gastonia, N.C. "I think they have done a perfect job."

Kline said the squadron is expected to serve in Afghanistan for about a year, and now faces a climatic challenge.

"This time of year when it's getting hotter and the sand starts to affect the aircraft more, we've seen components break that weren't breaking four or five months ago," Kline said. "So our supply department is leaning forward, working with supply departments back in the states. We're trying to predict what will break and get those assets here beforehand."

MALS-40 has also taken steps to widen the scope of parts they are able to service, which Kline said means the Marines are able to help more squadrons with an increased range of support.

"The biggest thing we've done since we've been here is improve the repair capabilities for the squadrons," said Kline. "In the first four months we identified and incorporated repair capability for over 150 new components that previously were not repaired out here. So, that affords the

squadrons a quick turnaround on parts in order to get the aircraft back in the sky."

Kline said that even though MALS-40 is behind the scenes of most of what occurs in the day to day operations in Afghanistan, they are still very involved in the overall mission of 2nd MAW (Fwd.).

"These Marines are turning the wrenches and delivering the parts 24/7," said Kline. "Even though they're not outside the wire engaged in direct combat with the enemy, the mission that Marines here complete is an enabler for aircraft to be up in the air, to engage with the enemy or execute [medical evacuations]. Every time you see a Marine aircraft up in the air there is a Marine somewhere within the MALS that had a hand in making that happen."

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

### New Hampshire win, dedicated to late friend, puts Chase in reach

Any Sprint Cup victory is special to a driver, but Ryan Newman's 15th, which came on Sunday at New Hampshire Motor Speedway, had to stand above the rest.

It was a dominating performance, as he started on the pole, led 119 of 301 laps, saved enough fuel to make it to the end and then held off his teammate and car owner Tony Stewart in the closing laps to seal the victory.

The win moved Newman to eighth in the Sprint Cup standings and puts him in a good position to earn a berth in the Chase for the Sprint Cup. He can get in either by staying in the top 10 or by getting one of the wild-card spots that go to race winners not in the top 10 when the 26-race regular season ends.

The victory also gave Newman a chance to dedicate the win to his friend Beau Slocumb, who died in April.

Slocumb, from Juliette, Ga., was an up-and-coming race driver who shared an interest in the outdoors with Newman. He had advanced from Legends cars to Late Models to ARCA and was poised to go even further – with Newman's help – when he was diagnosed with cancer.

Newman was emotional as he mentioned his late friend in Victory Lane and in his comments afterward.

"He died in April," Newman said. "I've worn a bracelet ever since. I wanted to make sure that bracelet could remind me how tough life can be, what it can throw to you, sometimes to the best people you could ever imagine."

"That was something that's emotional to me. It's hard to talk about it because I know his family. I know his wife. It's tough."

"He was living with us. To see

some of the things that he went through, to help him fight that battle, that was really tough for me."

Getting back to Victory Lane for the first time since the first Phoenix race of 2010 also had been tough for Newman, but in a different way, even though he's run well most of the time and stayed in contention for a Chase berth.

"We've been really good for three quarters of the race, then we'll come home fourth, fifth, tenth, not maybe make the right call, strategy, whatever it is to put

ourselves in the box of top five to close out the race," he said. "There have been times where we had failures, bad pit stops. All those things add up."

But at New Hampshire, the good decisions added up to a win.

"We have to sit down as an organization to figure out why this weekend was so great, how to carry it over into the next six and then into the last 10," Newman said.

But first, there's an off-week before the circuit heads to Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Newman said that even though he and his team have momentum right now, he'll gladly take the time off.

"Doing what we do, you'll take a week off anytime you can get it," he said. "This is a demanding sport ... We work so hard to get the things that we do on the race track, sometimes it's nice to take a weekend off away from the race track, neutralize yourself."

"We're not going to kick it out of gear for very long. This is huge for our team, even bigger for our organization ..."

"Going into Indianapolis with a lot of weight off our shoulders and a smile on our face is going to be really nice for our team and organization."

### 100th NASCAR win puts Busch halfway to personal goal

With his 100th major NASCAR win in the books, Kyle Busch is now halfway home to his often-stated goal of wanting to win 200 NASCAR races before he retires. And at age 26, it's quite possible he can do that.

His 100th win, which came in Saturday's Nationwide Series race at New Hampshire, also ties him with Mark Martin for the lead in most career Nationwide wins. Both now have 49.

Among those congratulating Busch in Victory Lane was Martin, who said Busch likely isn't done winning. Martin also had praise for the way Busch races.

"He is his own guy on the race track," Martin said. "He races really, really hard. He gets a lot out of his race car, and he doesn't hit a lot of stuff doing it."

"It's hard to find someone who races as hard as he does and does not cross the line every once in a while. It seems like from my experience watching him and racing against him, if you don't cross the line with him, he won't cross the line with you, and that's pretty incredible for his intensity."

Busch said he's not trying to compare his accomplishments or his goal of winning 200 races with those of Richard Petty and David Pearson, who both have more than 100 victories in Sprint Cup alone.

"I always said it's 200 and whether it's relative to Richard [Petty] or to David Pearson's – that's not what I'm out here for," he said. "It's for myself and myself only and to be able to achieve a goal. You set your goals high and you try to get out there and do it. If I

set a goal that I knew I could reach, then it wouldn't really be a goal."

"It's off in the horizon, it's a few years down the road, but hopefully one day we get to 200."

But he doesn't mind hearing his name associated with some of the all-time greats in the Nationwide Series, drivers like Martin, Sam Ard and Tommy Houston.

"It's fun to look back on those and see that my name is atop the list with the rest of those guys," he said. "There's many more to go, hopefully."

Busch didn't have such a good day on Sunday. He blew a tire early and lost the Sprint Cup points lead to Carl Edwards.

Our goal was to display the power and might of the Marines through our drill and music, and to tell the story of the Marine Corps," Szabo added.


Szabo said he was pleased with the band's performance during the two-day event and said the presentation was the culmination of months of practice.



The trio of long-suffering and frustrated friends, who devise a plan to murder their respective overbearing bosses with disastrous results, are portrayed by:

Jason Bateman ("Paul," "Switch," "Couples Retreat") as Nick Hendricks, a management candidate who has been logging 12-hour days for a promise of a well earned promotion that will never happen.

Charlie Day ("Bad Company") as Dale Arbus, a dental assistant, who has been struggling to maintain his self-respect against the relentless X-rated advances of his boss.

Jason Sudeikis ("Hall Pass," "Going the Distance") as Kurt Buckman, an accountant who has just learned that his company's corrupt new owner, is not only bent on ruining his career but plans to funnel toxic waste into an unsuspecting population.

Their respective tyrannical bosses are played by Kevin Spacey ("21") as Dave Harken, Nick's sadistic boss, who verbally tears into him; Jennifer Aniston ("Marley and Me") as a nymphomaniac dentist, Dr. Julia Harris, the sexually aggressive boss of Dale, who constantly subjects him to sexual harassment; and Colin Farrell ("Crazy Heart") as Bobby Pellitt, Kurt's boss who is a bigot, (playing the cameo part unrecognizable in a fat suit and balding hair).

Jamie Foxx ("Ray") portrays Dean ("expletive") Jones, a fast-talking con artist, whose street credibility is priced on a sliding scale, and who assists Nick, Dale and Kurt with advice on how to execute the murders.

Co-starring are Julie Bowen ("Jumping the Broom"), Donald Sutherland ("The Eagle") as Jack Pellitt, and Lindsay Sloane as Stacy.

Seth Gordon ("Four Christmases") directed this crude comedy and fantasy plot, where three friends try to kill their superiors.

"Horrible Bosses" is a big bawdy, absurd and hilarious over-the-top dark comedy that will bring some giggles to the workplace.

### LARRY CROWNE (PG-13)

"Larry Crowne" is a dramatic comedy about how the hard knocks from today's

recession inspire one everyday guy.

Tom Hanks ("Toy Story," "The Da Vinci Code," "Charlie Wilson's War") stars as Larry Crowne, a middle-age man and Navy veteran, who is an all-time optimist, a resourceful team leader and popular employee at a Walmart-like store.

When the store is forced to downsize, Larry gets the ax because he doesn't have a college degree.

With time on his hands, and instead of wallowing in self-pity, he decides to reinvent himself by enrolling in the local community college.

While at college, he forms some unexpected bonds with fellow students, who are all in the same situation trying to make a better future for themselves.

Larry becomes part of this colorful community of outcasts, often moving around town on scooters, and makes friends with Talia, played by Gugu Mbatha-Raw ("Closure"), and her boyfriend Dell, played by Wilmer Valderrama ("Fast Food Nation").

Larry also is catching the eye of his teacher in the public-speaking class and develops a huge crush.

Julia Roberts ("Eat Pray Love," "Mona Lisa Smile," "Pretty Woman") stars as Mercedes Tainot, a cranky, unhappily married speech professor at the Junior College. Mercedes is disillusioned with her job, her deadbeat husband Dean, played by Bryan Cranston ("The Lincoln Lawyer"), and drinks a little too much.

Mercedes can't deny that the changes in Larry are inspiring and that she finds him extremely attractive.

Now, the simple guy who has every reason to think his life is over, learns an unexpected lesson, and might just discover a reason to live.

Also appearing are Cedric the Entertainer ("Cadillac Records") as Larry's zany neighbor; Pam Grier ("Just Wright"), Taraji P. Henson ("Date Night"), and Rita Wilson ("It's Complicated").

The hilarious George Takei ("You Don't Mess With The Zohan") can be seen as the Economics professor, and Dale Dye ("Knight and Day") plays Cox, the man who fires Larry.

"Larry Crowne" is a low-key, funny and feel-good flick about a man who reinvents himself by going back to college. Hanks and Roberts have an easy rapport in this bittersweet, old-fashioned and warm feeling comedy.

# Fire Safety

In the United States, someone dies in a home fire every three hours, and someone is injured every half-hour.

Many of these deaths and injuries could be prevented if more people knew what to do in the case of an emergency. A news story about a residential fire provides a valuable opportunity to give your community a safety message during a teachable moment. Drop in these prevention tips and facts, and you just might save a life.

All U.S. homes should have working smoke alarms. The combination of working smoke alarms and home fire sprinklers lowers the risk of death from fire by more than 80 percent. In the event of a fire, escape first - then call for help.

### Stop a bedroom fire before it starts:

- Never smoke in bed.
- Replace mattresses made before the 2007 federal mattress flammability standard.
- Keep lighters and matches in a locked drawer or cabinet out of reach of children. Children are one of the highest risk groups for death in home fires.
- Do not run electrical cords under your bed or trap them against a wall where heat can build up. Never put too many plugs into an extension cord.
- Keep lit candles away from bedding, curtains, papers, and anything else that can catch fire easily.
- Take extra care when using space heaters. Keep bedding, clothes, curtains, and other flammable items at least three feet away from them.
- Only use laboratory-approved electric blankets and warmers. Check to make sure the cords are not worn away or coming apart.

### Be prepared for a fire:


- Have a working smoke alarm that can sound fast for both a fire that has flames, and a smoky fire that has fumes without flames. It is called a "Dual Sensor Smoke Alarm." A smoke alarm greatly reduces your chances of dying in a fire.
- Know your local emergency numbers. In most areas the number is 911.
- Remember to escape first, and then call the fire department.
- Practice finding your way out of the house with your eyes closed, crawling or staying low to the ground and feeling your way out of the house.
- Decide on a meeting place outside your home and check to see if anyone is missing. Everyone must get out and stay out of the house or apartment.
- Make sure everyone in your family knows at least two ways to escape from each room in the house or apartment.
- Help children and senior citizens to escape from a fire.

### Teaching children about fires:

- Let children know what a smoke alarm sounds like and what to do when they hear it.
- Always dress children in pajamas that meet federal flammability standards, which means if the pajamas are exposed to a small open flame, the flame will go out. Avoid dressing children for sleep in loose-fitting, 100 percent cotton clothes, such as oversized T-shirts.
- Teach children not to hide from firefighters, but to get out of the house quickly and call for help from somewhere else.
- Show children how to crawl low on the floor, below the smoke, to get out of the house.
- Show them how to stop, drop to the ground, and roll if their clothes catch fire.

### Tips:

- Never open a door that feels hot. Escape another way.
- A home can fill with thick, black smoke in just minutes.
- A small flame can become a major fire in less than 30 seconds.
- In a fire, get out right away. Don't pause to gather belongings.
- Never go back into a burning home for any reason.
- If someone is missing, tell firefighters.
