

Over \$1,500,000 in war materials stored in Cherry Point warehous have been declared surplus by the War Assets Administration and made available for civilian pur-chase in accordance with Maval reconversion plans, it was an-nounced this week by the Surplus Properties section of Navy Supply.

At the same time, Li. George L. Holmes of the station Motor Transport department stated that approximately \$16,600 in construc-tion vehicles on Cherry Point have been declared excess by the Fifth Naval District Transportation of-fice in Norfolk. The materials stored have






