

Reversing Props Speed Landings

A four-engine military airplane Dec. 13 at Washington, D. C. drop-ped from 15,00 feet with its pro-pellers pulling backward, to land at National Airport in about half the time it would take for a nor-mal landing from that altitude. It was the first demonstration over Washington of reversing the pitch of nropeller blades in flight, and was witnessed by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenbower, Air Chief of Staff Gen. Hoyt S. Christmas Trees Are Serious Fire Hagard To Public

Christman trees in places of multic assembly represent a ser-ious fire hazard. If the following rules are applied the hazard will be reduced to a minium. (a) Keep the tree out of any exits and paths. (b) Cat off the base of the tree at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it stand-ing in water. (c) All wiring is to be done by competent electricians to conform to approved standards. All lights set should bear the label approval of Under writers Laboratories. (d) The tree abould be checked daily for drynness. (e) Trees to be removed by 2 Jannary at he latest. Approval of the Station Fire Marshal or the Fire Chief will be required before placing Ciristmas trees in building on this station.
