Cherry Point Asks For \$1,765,000 Housing Fund

WASHINGTON. May 18-Defense Secretary Louis Johnson today re-quested authority from Congress to spend \$623,125,682 on housing and public works, urgenly needed by the three armed services. The bill, the first of its kind ever presented to legislators, covered the "minimum requirements" of the Army. Navy and Air Force according to Mr. Johnson. Letters sent to House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Chairman of the Senate and House Armed Services Committees by the defense chief stated that the authorizations requested in the proposed measure were "immediately necessary and critical in the light of the over-all strategic considerations of the service."

of the over-all strategic consideration To date, the Army and Navy had submitted individual bills for hous-ing and public works funds, which later were supplemented with se-parate requests for special pro-jects. It was declared that today's proposal would embrace all these needs in "a comprehensive, unified program." Proposed Maximum of \$16,500

Per Unit The proposed bill contains two provisions designed to compensate for recent criticisms of excessive housing costs in several overseas areas. Section 404 of the bill would limit floor space of family quarters to 1,050 square feet per unit. while section 405 allowed 9 maximum cost of only \$16,500 per family quit in the continental United States. While most of the housing funds requested would be for enlisted men, the maximum price figures would also apply to officers of general and flag rank. An estimated 5500 permanent family dwellings could be built in this country from the requested authorization, and 2000 more over-seas. Funds asked for this purpose w ent about \$57,600,000 and \$51,500,900, requestively. Officials of the National Military Establishment emphasized the fact the authorizations requested will meets for permanent family hous-ing, and in many instances will be less than 10 per cent of the cost required at individual Installations. Secretary Johnson, in addition to the housing authority, also sub-mitted a measure which included \$23,000,000 for emergency pro-lects specially authorized by the thred services Secretaries, and \$14,523,000 for the special weapons project. The \$14,529,000 would be spent at installations whose lo-cations and functions are classified us military secrets.

Measure Beaten By 227-163 Vote

Washington. May 24—A sudden House uprising led by young form-er GI's, today killed a \$400,000,000 a-year military pay boost bill, which would have given the raises to the "high brass." By a vote of 227 to 163, the bill was sent back to the Armed Ser-rices Committee for "study". Rep. Kilday (D-Tex.), floor manager for the measure, said "the bill is dead for several years to come."

The end was so quick and un-expected that generals and admir-als in the galleries exclaimed in bewilderment: "What happened?" One House member said the mo-

ral of the incident was that "Be kind to the enlisted man. because some day he may be elect-ed to Congress." But Kilday laid the bill's defeat to a combination of factors.

"First there was the economy crowd." he said. "Then there were the young veterans who wanted to

get some things off their chesta. And finally the liberal element always has opposed anything for the military."

always has opposed anything for the milliary." The upset was most directly traceable to a young Navy veteran, the Rev. Pat Sutton (D-Tenn.). A former demolition expert, he spearheaded repeated efforts by veterans on the floor to whitle benefits of top-ranking officers. The motion to send the bill back to the committee was supported by 121 Democrars, 105 Republicans and Rep. Marcantonio of New York, the
